


The objective of The Great Coin Race game is for students to be able to identify U.S. coins by name and value. The front and back coin images on the game boards and game cards are large and clear, so that students are able to get a closer look at coin features and characteristics.


This is a very simple game, but it gets the job done!


Easy prep: Print and laminate game boards (4). Print, laminate, and cut coin cards (or use plastic or real coins). Place coins in a sturdy cup/container.


Play: 2-4 players (2 players use 2 game boards, 4 players each have their own). Students take turns passing the cup and drawing a coin card. When a player draws a card, he/she must name the coin and value before handing it to the player who has that coin game board. Beginning at start, the player who is given a coin places it on a matching coin space. Heads or tail do not matter. The first player to reach the finish line wins the race. Clear boards and start again!
